

FOOTPRINTS INTO AFRICA

Sensing a real call from God while in Lubumbashi in the Democratic Republic of Congo, I came home and stood down as the Bishop of KZN, Rector of Christ Church Pinetown, cashed in my pension and launched out in absolute faith to

become a Missionary to Africa. I followed David Livingstone's journey across Central Africa visiting the memorial sites where he travelled to and then the final resting place where his treasured heart is buried in Chitambo's Village in Zambia and then visiting the place where his embalmed body lay in Zanzibar before being taken back to his homeland in Britain and laid to rest in Westminster Abby. I have the

incredible privilege of preaching at Pastor's Conferences, Leadership Seminars and have lived in the homes of my precious students. Following my dream has been an out of this world experience. By God's grace I have now completed 65 mission trips and I so identify with Livingstone who wrote:



"I am a missionary heart and soul. God had an only son and He was a missionary and a physician. A poor, poor imitation of Him I am or ever wish to be. In this service I hope to live; in it I wish to die."

Amazingly, my 40 years of ministry has been preserved and is a legacy I can give to my precious students to use for their work in serving the Lord Jesus. My sermon outlines, notes of most of the books of the Bible, Doctrine, practical ministry resources and my Journals are all available to order. All of these are also available freely on my website, which Gerhard our webmaster has so wonderfully put together. Friends this has been, and continues to be an incredible journey, which YOU my dear friends have made possible through your support, love, prayers and financial support. You have believed in me and my work and have stood with me and I am eternally grateful. From helping with my rent at the David Livingstone Mission House which is a place I love to be in, to even buying me some airtime for my cell phone. Also, to thank Christ Church Pietermaritzburg for so generously allowing us the use of the Fred Pieterse House as well as their Sunday School classrooms for lectures and exams, without these facilities we would be unable to continue ... I surely am the most blessed man in Africa.






BRINGING YOU UP TO DATE

Two of these students, Fred Kiiza (President/Legal Representative) and Ruheza Emmanuel (Second Vice-President/Legal Representative) are both doing a great work in Kigali at the <u>All the Bible in Community"</u> Project in Kigali.



About 95% of rural pastors in Rwanda have not even read through the New Testament. ABC is a start up ministry that was birthed through Garry Friesen (Dr. G) and his students at Africa College of Theology in Kigali, Rwanda. The rural churches asked for training of rural pastors. Their people were reading the Bible and had many questions, but their untrained pastors could not help them. This led to a simple model of training 40 rural pastors at a time over a one-year period and 300 hours of teaching activities. I greatly admire the work of Dr. Garry and over the past number of years I have had the joy of being an honoury member and have assisted ABC with lectures in their Pastoralia module.

In 2011, in his third year of studies at KMBC, Jean-Marie served as our Head Student. After returning to Kigali, he hosted two of my visits there and set up many opportunities for me to preach and teach which was wonderful, he did a great job of setting everything up.

them coming to KMBC. Together with a colleague, they paid for them to come to South Africa to study. It is a great joy for them to see the fruit of their faithfulness in supporting these two young men.
