This was a theological college started by Reverend William Tennent to train Presbyterian ministers in the late 1700s. George Whitfield said this of the college:

WHITFIELD wrote:




The place, says he, wherein the young men study now, is in contempt called 'The College'. It is a log house, about twenty feet long and near as many broad; and to me it seemed to resemble the school of the old prophets, for their habitations were mean; and that they sought not great things for themselves is plain from those passages of Scripture, wherein we are told that each of them took them a beam to build them a house: and that at the feast of the sons of the prophets, one of them put on the pot, whilst others went to fetch some herbs out of the field. All that we can say of most of our universities is, they are glorious without. From this despised place, seven or eight worthy ministers of Jesus have lately been sent forth; more are almost ready to be sent, and the foundation is now laying for the instruction of many others.


It was not a "posh" building, just a simple hall, built with logs... but... the teaching was brilliant. Whitfield wrote about the students coming out of this "log college":

The surest criterion by which to judge of the character of any school is to observe the attainments and habits of those educated in it. And, judging by this rule, a very high place must be assigned to the Log College, notwithstanding its diminutive and mean external appearance.

From this College came some of the greatest preachers America has ever produced, and again Whitfield wrote:

All, as far as we can learn, who proceeded from this school were men of sound orthodoxy, evangelical spirit, glowing zeal, and in labours abundant.




